The budget, potential adjustments to the State Paid Family Medical Leave and Earned Sick and Safe Time laws, and FTC conformity on Junk Fees are all potential policies HM is advocating on. This week I'm breaking down various omnibus bills, what they mean, and what the next steps are for the next few weeks.

Session Snapshot



The big picture: Omnibus bills are emerging from both chambers for almost every major policy area.

Senate omnibus bills: In the Senate, the following omnibus bills have been established and passed out of committee:

- <u>Labor Policy</u>
- Labor Finance
- Jobs and Economic Development (includes HM's ProStart funding)
- <u>Veterans</u>
- <u>Commerce and Consumer Protection</u>
- Housing and Homelessness Prevention
- Energy, Utilities, Environment and Climate
- Agriculture, Broadband, and Rural Development
- <u>Legacy</u>
- <u>Human Services</u>
- <u>Health</u>
- <u>Transportation</u>
- State and Local Government
- <u>Elections</u>
- <u>Higher Education</u>
- Education Finance
- Education Policy
- <u>Public Safety</u>
- What's next: These bills will be heard in the Finance Committee during the next few weeks. After passage through the committee, they will head to the Senate floor for debate.

House omnibus bills: The House has released almost all their omnibus bills. Two committees have yet to release their full budget bills: Health and Workforce, Labor and Economic Development. These bills will be posted in the next week and will have testimony taken when the legislature returns after the break. Here's a breakdown of the current omnibus bills in the House:

What's next: These bills will need to be heard in the House Ways and Means committee before heading to the floor for final passage. All House bills need to have bipartisan support for a bill to pass.

Yes, and: To change the Price Transparency Law passed last year, Hospitality MN intends to bring forward FTC conformity legislation as an amendment to the House and Senate Commerce omnibus bills.
